## Bomb kills man trying to install it

Residents of a quiet west Conta Costa County neighborhood were awakened Saturday morning by broken windows, crashing pictures and a "big boom" caused by a man whose bomb exploded as he attempted to place it under a vehicle, police said.

"I'm still in shock. It was a seary thing," said Chris Heiderick, who woke up at 5:30 to the explosion down the street, west of Martinez in an unincorporated part of the coun-

No residents were injured, but the unidentified man was killed by the blast, said Contra Costa County speriff's Sgt. Jim Hatchell.

"Reports of explosives are not thing. But later, when I went outunusual, but the actual detonation of a bomb is," Hatchell said.

He said the man was apparently attempting to put a bomb under a truck parked on Corte Del Sol Court when it went off in his hand. No motive has been established, Hatchell said.

Police said body parts were strewn along the street.

Neighbors who rushed to the scene were told to go back inside, said Heiderick.

Because the neighborhood of five homes is half a mile from a Shell Oil refinery, many thought the plant was the source of the ex-

"I looked to see if it was a fire," said Heiderick. "I didn't see anyside again, I figured police would tell us to evacuate. But they just said to go inside. I didn't really want to look.

"Nothing like this has ever happened out here," she said. Heiderick said her van was dent-

ed during the explosion. The driver's side of the truck was severely damaged.

She said she did not know who might have planted the bomb, if the man lived in the neighborhood or whether he knew the owner of the truck that was bombed.

"It really frightened me because there are so many children on the court," she said. "If it happened any other time, I can't imagine what would have happened."

Police said Navarro was babysitting her young niece when the terrier attacked. The child ran for help, and neighbors Howard and Marvin Shelton responded, kicking in the door. Unable to distract the animal with food, one of the men ran for a baseball bat and beat the

dog to make it let go.

John Nenni, the dog owner's husband, said the terrier, named "Bogie," was a registered champion with the American Kennel Club. He described it as "a companion dog."

Nenni pointed out that bull terriers are smaller than pit bulls and are completely different from the dog with the killer record.

"He was a champion show dog." mourned Nenni. "They're very human-oriented. He was locked in his run, and she reached in to grab his collar. His run is like his castle.'

### Assembly to get tough recycling bills

SACRAMENTO -- Assembly Speaker Willie Brown said Saturday that Assembly leaders will introduce a package of bills this year to outlaw used-tire dumps, encourage recycling and restrict packaging that destroys ozone.

The San Francisco Democrat told radio listeners that the 23 million used tires that Californians throw out every year should be recycled into rubberized asphalt, artificial reefs, retaining walls and other products.

Brown said proposed legislation would phase out the state's eight large used-tire piles, which he said become homes for rodents and mosquitoes and pose serious fire

He said other bills would restrict

packaging made from chemicals that destroy the earth's protective ozone layer, require the state government to buy more recycled materials and expand recycling opportunities.

"Each year in this country we throw away enough wood to build 1 million homes, discard enough paper to produce all of our newspapers, bury enough aluminum to build 500,000 house trailers," he
