### A CITIZENS' TICKET AT ANDERSON DETERMINED ON

Representatives of Old Parties Get Together And Arrange to Meet Common Enemy, The Liberals

Anderson, August 14.—That there will be a citizens' or independent ticket in the municipal campaign here was decided in a mass meeting. The report of the nonpartisan committee was declared unanimously adopted. Wallace B. Campbell, a former republican, who aligned with the progressives a year ago, presided, and his name was the first signed to the committee report, which was read by J. A. VanOsdol, a republican. Other members of the committee were: Frank Matthews, democrat; Ananias Beach, prohibitionist; Oscar Carr, socialist; Robert Gilmore, prohibitionist; Dr. B. H. Pierce, republican.

The alignment of Mr. Campbell with the independent ticket movement was a distinct disappointment to the bull moosers, for Campbell had been regarded as one of their assets. He was active in a recent meeting of the local bull moosers when they adopted their platform for the city campaign. Republicans were in the majority in the mass meeting and for that reason they think the republicans will not have a city ticket. Dr. Pierce was among the most active republicans in the city campaign four years ago. With the independent ticket it appears there will not be less than five tickets in the election in November. The democratic ticket was nominated by a primary election in May. The progressives will have a primary election August 30. Each of the two factions of the socialists has nominated a city ticket.

### FORTY-FIVE CITIES TO HAVE FAIRS THIS FALL

Forty-five Indiana cities will hold fairs this fall. Dates for fairs in this part of the state are as follows: Goshen, Elkhart county, September 9-12; Huntington, Huntington county, September 9-13; Decatur, Adams county, September 16-19; Kendallville, Noble county, September 22-26; Bremen, Marshall county, September 22-26; Bourbon, Marshall county, October 1-3; North Manchester, Wabash county, October 1-3.

### WILL COST \$614,619,100 TO DISPLACE WOOD CARS

That it will cost the railroads \$614,619,100 to comply with the proposed federal law requiring them to replace their present wooden passenger equipment with steel cars, is the statement contained in a bulletin issued by a special committee on relations of railway operations to legislation which represents all the leading lines in the country.

are satisfied that there has been only a partial revelation of the facts so far, and we are satisfied that he has been guilty of no wilful wrong doing; and we will ask for the public in his behalf, a suspension of judgment until all the facts can be disclosed before the proper tribunal, and in an orderly way.

The statements in the papers that the governor will, if necessary resort to force to maintain his position are the merest rot. He will meet the charges made against him in an orderly and dignified way and will do nothing unbecoming the dignity of the state, and will engage in no physical scramble to assert his rights to discharge the functions pertaining to the office of governor.

### Sulzer Impeached.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 14.—William Sulzer, governor of New York, was impeached by the lower house of the legislature at 5:16 a. m. after an all night session by a vote of 79 to 45 on charges of having diverted campaign contributions to his private use and having made under false oath statements as to his campaign receipts.

This is the first time in the history of the state that a governor has been impeached by the legislature.

Court of Impeachment Sept. 18. The articles of impeachment against Governor Sulzer, adopted by the assembly, were presented to the senate late in the afternoon and received. Senator Wagner, president pro tempore of the senate, called a meeting of the court of impeachment for Wednesday, September 18, at noon. He also announced the senate would appoint a day for the trial of Governor Sulzer "in due time."

Chance of Divided Authority. Lieutenant Governor Martin H. Glynn came into Albany from his summer home at Cedar Hill during the forenoon and went to his newspaper office as usual. If Governor Sulzer is deposed Mr. Glynn will automatically take his place.

The possibility of two men endeavoring to discharge the functions of the chief executive at the same time suggests a chaotic condition that the courts alone would have power to deal with.

John B. Stanchfield, of New York, will be counsel to prosecute the articles of impeachment if Mr. Stanchfield returns from Europe in time for the opening of the trial. If Mr. Stanchfield is not to be here in time there is talk of the selection of ex-Senator Edgar T. Brackett, of Saratoga.

### MRS. SULZER IS PROSTRATED

Declares to Nurses She Has Ruined Her Husband's Career.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Mrs. Sulzer, wife of the governor, is suffering from nervous breakdown. Her condition is extremely serious and while not such as to raise any doubt as to her recovery, it has given her husband grave fears.

She is almost inconsolable at times and keeps repeating to her friends and nurses at the bedside that she has ruined her husband's career, by her speculation in Wall street.

### AMERICAN PARTY IS INJURED

Tourists in Automobile Meet Accident Near Bristol Channel.

London, Aug. 14.—Three American tourists, two of whom are understood to be Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Y. Anderson, of Philadelphia, were seriously injured in an automobile accident between Lynton and Lynmouth, at the entrance to the Bristol channel.

The tourists were badly cut and bruised, but it is not thought that their injuries will prove fatal. One woman who escaped injury fell on the road. The injured are at the local hospital.

### INDIANA INDIANS PICNIC

150 Miamis and Pottawatomies Meet Near Peru to Discuss Means of Realizing on Big Claim.

Peru, August 14.—A picnic of Miami and Pottawatomie Indians was held at Boyd park, nine miles east of Peru, Sunday, and there were 150 present, representing the Indian families in Miami, Grant and Wabash counties. The oldest was Susan Pym, aged ninety-four, who lives east of Peru.

It is the hope of those most active in the reunions to bring about a new interest in the claims of the Indians against the United States government for \$100,000, said to be due as a result of a treaty signed in 1843. The question was taken up two years ago and Congressman George Rauch introduced a bill for the claim.

## America no Place for Freak Gentlemen of this Species

New York, August 14.—McNorton is going back to Europe without one cent of the thousands he expected to acquire through exhibition of his prowess as a human aquarium. His name is Gustave Leclair and he is French from birth to gestation, but he explained that in France—as elsewhere—a foreign name has more instant appeal to popular interest.

He eats only once a day, always at midnight, and he has two employees to care for the dozen small frogs and an equal number of little goldfish who temporarily disport themselves in the place where his food ought to be, but is not at the time of his performances. In Berlin at the Circus Busch he was a great hit. First, he drinks one hundred glasses of water. Then he slips the frogs and the goldfish gently into his mouth and swallows all the water in the bowl they have occupied.

### Brings Them Out Again Alive.

While the audience sits astonished McNorton smokes a cigar and utters pleasantities in French. Presently he asks persons near the stage if they prefer frog or fish. If the answer is for frog McNorton calls "Josphone," and puts his fingers to his lips and pulls out a little wriggling frog which he drops into the bowl that has been refilled. With other jests he produces frogs or gold fish as demanded until his personal aquarium is emptied. Vaudeville houses here booked him for four weeks at a big salary, but the advertising suggested that Norton was going to eat frogs alive on the stage and the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals notified his managers that such a performance would not be permitted. ### WHERE PINS GO TO

For many years the world has been baffled by the problem of where the pins go that are turned out in millions and millions by the pin factories.

But the problem seems to have been solved at last. A Paris scientist, Dr. Xavier, has been experimenting on pins, hairpins and needles by the simple process of watching a few. He states that they practically disappear into thin air by changing into ferrous oxide, a brown rust that is soon blown away in the dust.

An ordinary hairpin took 134 days to blow away. A steel nib lasted just under fifteen months. A common pin took eighteen months to vanish. A polished needle defied the ravages of the atmosphere longer, taking two and a half years to disappear.

So the reason why the world is not foot deep in the pins it buys is, it seems, exactly the same which makes an iron surface scale off when exposed for a long time to the atmosphere without the protection of paint.

### PLEASURE PARTY DROWNS

Launch Caught in Swell of Tug Goes Down at Superior, Wis.

### "LUCK" TO THE MEMBER WHO PORVES BEST TALKER

Diamond Club Promoter Naively Explains How Awards Are Made—People Caught by Lottery?

South Bend, August 14.—Abraham Eisner, president of the United States Diamond Importing Co., Chicago, was arrested Wednesday morning for advertising a lottery. He was released on \$300 bond.

Eisner came to South Bend Tuesday afternoon to attend the trial of John Hogau, a collector for the firm, and to deny the charges made against the company by J. O. Dailey, a barber. Both men are now out on bond. The trial will be held August 21.

Eisner protested in an interview Tuesday afternoon against his institution being characterized as a lottery. "We have a club into which each member pays dues toward the purchase of jewelry," he said. "As an advertising feature we give away one article of jewelry each week to one of our members."

"How do you select the lucky man?" he was asked. "Is there a drawing?"

"Oh, no," he protested. "We simply select some member who is well known and who is likely to tell people about his good fortune."

### BIG ARMY OF UNEMPLOYED

Germany Caring for Unprecedented Number—Situation Grows Worse.

Berlin, Aug. 14.—As a result of the protracted financial and industrial depression Germany is confronted by the problem of caring for an unprecedented army of unemployed.

It is estimated that the unprecedented number of 50,000 persons are out of employment in Berlin, thousands of whom will have no chance to go to work for five months.

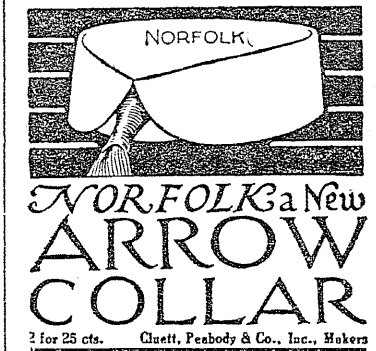
Indications are this number will be increased when winter arrives.
