COUNCIL CHAMBER.

Virginia, Minn., April 30, 1915. Regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Virginia, Minnesota.

Council called to order by the President. Roll called. Present, Aldermen Heritage, Harvey, Walsh, Matheson, Murray, Lien, McGhee, Coffey, Mr. President—8. Absent, None.

Reading of minutes of previous meeting. Moved and supported that the minutes be approved as read.

Sam Hinch, 101 Chestnut street, John Anderson, 224 Chestnut street, applied for renewal of liquor licenses and each submitted a \$2,000 surety bond.

Moved and supported that the applications be granted, the licenses ordered issued, the bonds accepted and ordered filed after being approved by the city clerk and attorney.

Separate resolutions be drawn and presented for adoption.

Carried.

The Titcher Electric company applied for permit to erect and maintain an electric sign over the entrance of the Central Hotel, at No. 315½ Chestnut street, and submitted the usual fee of \$2.00.

Moved and supported that the application be granted and that the sign be erected according to the ordinance by the electric inspector and approved by the city clerk and attorney.

Carried.

Mayor Boylan presented for ratification by the council the report of A. D. Heritage as a member of the light and water commission and R. C. Pickering, Mrs. Adeltrotter and Mrs. C. Whiting, as members of the library board.

Moved and supported that the appointment of the members of the light and water commission and the library board be confirmed.

Alderman McGhee submitted an amendment which was supported that the action of the council on these appointments be separate and that the council vote on the amendment for the president declared the same adopted.
