

Charity Has Calamity Room For Use of Unemployed

The maintenance of a calamity room, where homeless, unemployed men may find shelter for the night, was one of the interesting features brought out in the report of the club's club, at the Bishop's club meeting last night by Miss Jean Porter, chairman. The calamity room was occupied 74 nights last winter. Men have been given to 50 unemployed men, two bolts of flannel and one of muslin have been made up as undergarments, 110 worth of shoes and stockings were given away at Christmas time, and the committee visitors have made visits to 130 families. The relief work was begun in November, when 34 families were supplied with Thanksgiving baskets of food. The number of parcels given to unemployed men was 450.

The unemployed man is the biggest factor to be considered in relief work," said Miss Porter last night. "We faced an unusually hard winter, of course, in that respect, but the popular feature of our welfare work has been the ticket exchange, those who bought more tickets for entertainment than they needed, and those who were unable to use them, have sent them to us for distribution, and it has been a real pleasure to report there where they would do the most good. Births and deaths have been interesting incidents of the work, and there bids fair to be a June decline."

Miss Winifred Corcoran gave an interesting talk on the Panama canal—its history, its construction, its system of locks and tolls, and its sanitary conditions. Miss Corcoran called attention to the fact that Col. George A. Goethals passed some years in Duluth when the piers were being built, and supervised the work.

Bishop McDevick was not present, so there was not the usual explanation of the Bible reading. The Scripture passage from St. Paul to the Corinthians was read by Mrs. J. M. Rooney of Superior. Mrs. Fred Sherman, the Bishop's club's delegate to the Woman's council, gave the report of the year's work of the council, as well as the report of the county farm committee. The committee provides literature for the poor farm, and an entertainment once a month. The report of the library committee was given by Mrs. T. J. Killeen. These reports were richly a part of the program for the annual meeting which will be held May 4.
