Comment on Explosion.

That the blowing up of the Eddystone ammunition works was an act significant in the present day hostilities with Germany was the opinion of General Resche, who recalled the Maine tragedy as the signal of the Spanish-American war. "It was the work of some irresponsible parties, perhaps German sympathizers, that has put the United States under arms now, as it did then," he said, "and it is just such actions as that which has forced the three companies in Duluth into service, as it will throughout the United States. I am satisfied that proper steps are being taken at home, and I only hope that the same is true over the country."
