

# CRIMINAL CASES TO GET START IN COURT TOMORROW

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## Case Last to Be Tried. Liquor Violations to Be Heard First.

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Criminal cases will hold sway in district court this week, and a start on the calendar to be prosecuted by Mason Forbes, assistant county attorney, will be made tomorrow. Violations of the liquor laws are the first cases which will be brought for trial before Judge W. A. Cant, to be followed by the smaller larceny cases.

Civil cases which were not concluded last Friday will be resumed again tomorrow, including the trial of the alienation of affections case in Judge J. D. Ensign's division in which Leon Antoskiewicz asks \$10,000 damages from John Burzenski.

### Other Cases.

Judge Bert Fesler will resume trial in the case of Elizabeth Amy against the Wallace-Robertson Lumber company in which it is claimed that timber was cut by the defendant on plaintiff's land. This case was ready for the jury last Friday. In Judge Cant's division final evidence will be submitted in the case of M. M. Gasser against the Great Northern Life Insurance company, which concern the plaintiff claimed agreed to establish headquarters in Duluth and caused him to invest \$5,000, which he seeks to recover because of the company's failure to agreement.

In Judge H. A. Dancer's division the case of Genevieve Farrar to recover on a life insurance policy from the Locomotive Engineers Life and Accident Insurance association will be concluded and given to the jury tomorrow.
