Inspector Finds Autos Increase By <u>58 Per Cent</u>

Wheelage Tax Records Show Duluth's Gain Since War Ended.

THE actual number of licensed automobiles used on the streets of Duluth so far this year shows an increase of 58 per cent over 1918, according to records of Morris J. Segal, city license in-

Morris J. Segal, city license inspector. In 1918 there were 2,941 automobiles that paid the wheelage tax, so far this year there are already 4,650. The number

may reach 4.800 by Dec. 31, according to Mr. Segal.

The number of automobiles on the Duluth streets has more than trebled since 1915. Collections from the wheelage tax have increased from \$20,498 in 1915 to \$53,000 thus far n 1919.

In 1916 1,659 automobiles were

taxed, and 2,258 in 1917.
