

VIRGINIA FAMILY REUNITED AFTER 6 YEARS' TRYING

Woman and Three Sons Arrive in Queen City; Husband and Daughters Meet Wrong Train.

VIRGINIA Aug. 26.—After six years' endeavor to make the trip from Warsaw, Poland, to the United States, Mrs. Freida Schwartz, wife of Joseph Schwartz, 132 Second street South, accompanied by her three sons, Leon, Abraham and Israel, arrived here this morning.

Though their arrival was expected Schwartz and his daughters, Mrs. B. Karon and Miss Rose Schwartz met the wrong train, with the result that the new arrivals had to make use of poor English in asking a policeman to guide them to their home.

Plans to bring Mrs. Schwartz and her three sons to the United States were completed in 1914, but the war began when the party reached Bendzin. Two of the sons remained there, but Mrs. Schwartz and the other boy returned to Warsaw.

Mrs. Schwartz says that reports of living conditions in Poland during the war were not exaggerated. One of her sisters starved to death.

Even now, Mrs. Schwartz added, food prices are exceedingly high. Bread costs 25 marks per pound and can be obtained only after waiting in line, which forms about 4 o'clock every morning. Sugar costs 100 marks per pound. Other prices are correspondingly high.

Passport regulations, she said, are severe.
