Fugitive Case Continued

Demanding an examination, was arraigned in municipal court yesterday on a charge of being a fugitive from justice, Erick G. Anderson was given a continued hearing until tomorrow.

Court Convicts Three.

Three men were convicted on charges of violating liquor laws and two forfeited \$300 bail in municipal court yesterday. John R. Johnson, Joe Veligrese, John Acker and William Porter were charged with possessing liquor. Johnson forfeited \$100 bail; Acker forfeited \$200; Veligrese pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and costs and Porter was paroled after he pleaded guilty and was given a 30-day sentence at the work farm. Henry Miller, charged with selling liquor, pleaded guilty and was committed to the work farm for 60 days.

Gun Toting Denied.

Charged with carrying concealed weapons, Charles F. Walters pleaded not guilty in municipal court yesterday. His hearing was continued until today. His bail was fixed at \$200.

Lumber Trial Begins.

Trial of the suit of Samuel Klatzky against Isabel Thomas Lovejoy, as executrix of the will of Allen P. Lovejoy and Robert E. Carroll, as manager of the Duluth Lumber company, for \$6,330.16, was begun before a jury in Judge H. A. Dancer's court yesterday. The plaintiff claims that that amount is due him for timber and labor furnished the lumber company.

Verdict Directed for Plaintiff.

A verdict for \$1,131.85, directed by Judge W. A. Cant, in favor of Ernest G. Robie and against the Floodwood Cash grocery, was returned by a jury in district court yesterday. Robie sued the company for \$1,034.67, which he alleged was due him on claims he purchased from the company's creditors.

Register Company Gets Verdict.

Judgment for \$720 in favor of the National Cash Register company and against the North Shore White Bus Line company was ordered by Judge H. A. Dancer in district court yesterday. The register company asked for that amount claiming that it was due them on cash registers sold to the bus company.

The plaintiff alleges she received injuries when struck by an automobile driven by the defendant at Fourteenth avenue West and Superior street, Sept. 7, 1921.

\$2,730 Will Filed.

Petition for probate of the will of Phillip Nobert, Gilbert, who died March 28, 1920, was filed in probate court yesterday. The widow, Alvina Nobert, is bequeathed the estate, valued at \$2,730.

Hartley Will Admitted.

The will of the late G. G. Hartley was admitted for probate by Probate Judge S. W. Gilpin yesterday. The widow Carrie E. Hartley, Cavour Hartley, son, and Irma Claypool, Judith H. Lewis, and Jessie H. Congdon, daughters, are made executors of the estate.

Theft Suspect Taken.

David Foy, age 24, electrician, is being held by the police as a grand larceny suspect. He was arrested yesterday by Lieut. Oscar Olson and David Cavanaugh of the Bertillon department. Police said Foy may be connected with the robbery of a gold and silver chalice, valued at \$65, and the contents of a penny box from the German Catholic church, Third avenue East and Second street. The robbery occurred Sunday.

Planning Ordinance Passed.

The ordinance providing for a city planning department, introduced by Mayor S. F. Snively, was passed by a 3-to-1 vote at the city council meeting yesterday. Commissioner W. F. Murnian dissented. Commissioner Leonidas Merritt was absent.
