

Two Injured in Auto Mishaps, Heat Has Toll

A 7-year-old girl and a man were in a Duluth hospital last night as a result of auto accidents, both of which, according to reports made at police headquarters, were held accidental.

The girl, Yvonne Morrill, whose parents reside in East End, was struck by an auto driven by Francis B. Mahler, 1524 East Fourth street, at Forty-seventh avenue East and London road. The police report stated the girl stepped from the curb directly into the path of the auto. She was taken to St. Mary's hospital where an examination showed she was severely bruised about the head. Her condition was not considered serious.

John Kmiecik, 227 East Fourth street, was bruised about the legs when he was struck by an auto driven by Lee Latta, 315 West First street. The accident was on Rice Lake road above the boulevard, where Latta told the police the man walked into the road in front of his car apparently unnoticed its approach. Kmiecik was taken to St. Mary's hospital.

An automobile driven by Arvid W. Hedlund collided with a street car at Fourth avenue East and Fourth street, shortly before midnight. The automobile was wrecked. No one was injured. Hedlund was brought to headquarters.

Mandan, N. D., June 23.—While making an attempt to rescue two younger sisters, Sophia and Dorothy, age 13 and 18, daughters of Fred Heraog, of Shields, lost their lives in the swift waters of the Cannonball river near here late yesterday. The four girls were on the edge of the river, 50 feet from their home, when the two younger ones slipped and fell into the stream. The two older girls jumped in, in an effort to rescue them and were caught by the current and carried down the river. Their screams attracted the attention of a brother, who vainly dived in an attempt to locate the bodies, while there still was hope of resuscitation. The two younger girls, in the meantime, had been carried by the current close to the shore and caught hold of some willows and hung there until rescued. According to advices received here today, the bodies of the two victims had not been recovered.

Minneapolis, June 23.—Half a dozen persons were overcome by the heat here today, when the weather bureau thermometer registered 99.1 degrees above zero. Some street thermometers reached 104. Today was the warmest day here since July 28, 1917, when 99.3 was reached.
