EXPERT APPROVAL GIVEN FOREST FIRE GUARD WORK.

A quiet inquiry by United States government experts has resulted in strong approval of the Minnesota forest service's work in guarding woodlands of the state from forest fires. This became known when J. G. Peters of Washington, assistant United States forester in charge of public relations, stopped in St. Paul after a trip to the wooded region of northern Minnesota.

Mr. Peters declined to make any direct comments upon the recent controversy between State Forester Grover M. Consett and Ray P. Chase, state auditor, during the course of which Mr. Chase assailed the forester's fire prevention work, saying, "Kindly providence and not the forester has averted forest fires." Mr. Peters did point out, however, that the United States government is spending \$100,000 a year in forest fire protection in Minnesota. Seventy thousand dollars of this sum goes directly to the state forest service to aid in financing its own work. If this money were being wasted the United States forest service would like to know about it, the assistant forester admitted, so that it could be expended more effectively somewhere else.

LEGION NOTES.

Music will play a big part in the Austin Legion and Legion Auxiliary state convention August 6-7-8, reports Harry Smith publicity officer, who announces that drum corps are coming from Albert Lea, Canby, Hibbing, Staples, Red Wing, Winona, Park Rapids, St. Paul, Faribault, Madella, Plainville, Mankato and other points, with bands from Duluth, St. Paul, Silver Lake, also Morris Castle show band.

For the first time in Minnesota Legion-Auxiliary history there will be a ladies drum corps contest with valuable cash prizes, in addition to that for the Legion boys. The Legion Auxiliary drum corps from Hibbing, Canby and Albert Lea are among the feminine musical outfits. In the massed singing of convention delegates the women will uphold their reputation too, both at their own convention and the joint session they are to hold with the Legion. With special low railroad rates, good auto roads, a convention city convenient to the bulk of Minnesota's Legion and Auxiliary population, the Austin department convention August 6-7-8 promises to draw huge crowds, particularly for the big parade, in which scores of poets and units have signified their intention of entering dazzling floats, drill teams, bands, corps and other spectacles.

July 31 and August 1-3 Duluth Legionnaires will stage a huge historical pageant in which over 1,000 persons will participate on a 400-foot platform in the natural Lakeshore park amphitheater, wearing elaborate costumes typifying Arrowhead history. President Coolidge and the governors of Minnesota and Wisconsin have been invited. Huge flood lights will illuminate the performers as they portray the rich treasures of Northeastern Minnesota history.


