### EXPERT APPROVAL GIVEN FOREST FIRE GUARD WORK

A quiet inquiry by United States rovernment experts has resulted in strong approval of the Minnesota forest service's work in guarding woodlands of the state from forest fires. This became known when J. G Peters of Washington, assistant United States forester in charge of public relations, stopped in St. Paul after a trip to the wooded region of northern Minnesota.

Mr. Peters declined to make anv direct comments upon the recent controversy between State Forester Groven M. Conzet and Ray P. Chase, state auditor, during the course of which Mr. Chase assailed the forester's fire pre vention work, saying, "Kindly pro vidence and not the forester has avert ed forest fires." Mr. Peters did point out, however, that the United States government is spending \$100,000 a year in forest fire protection in Minnesota Seventy thousand dollars of this sum goes directly to the state forest service to aid in financing its own work If this money were being wasted the United States forest service would like to know about it, the assistant forester admitted, so that it could be expended more effectively somewhere else.


