## LA FOLLETTE FAR AHEAD

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 6.—Walter J. Kohler's lead over Congressman Joseph D. Beck for the Republican nomination for governor was placed at approximately 25,000 votes today, pending official tabulation of returns from the 2,760 precincts in Wisconsin. In 2,521 precincts out of 2,760 for governor, the result was: Kahler, 210,311. Beck, 189,177.  
Last minute returns continued to pile up the total accumulated by Sen. Robert M. LaFollette Jr., for the Republican senatorial nomination to succeed himself. With but 103 precincts missing, LaFollette had 300,961 votes to George Mead's 152,946.  
Kohler's defeat of Congressman Beck is the second time Senator LaFollette has been unsuccessful in his efforts to nominate a gubernatorial candidate with his endorsement. LaFollette backed Ekern in 1926, and Beck in yesterday's primary.  
Both Governor Zimmerman, incumbent, and Mayor George W. Mead of Wisconsin Rapids, had the endorsement of the Anti-Saloon League. The wet endorsement was split between Kohler and Beck.  
Nearly all the counties that were carried by Zimmerman in 1926 went to Kohler and Beck. That organization which the governor created in 1926 collapsed like a bellows.
