### The Justwed Pedders Are In Florida

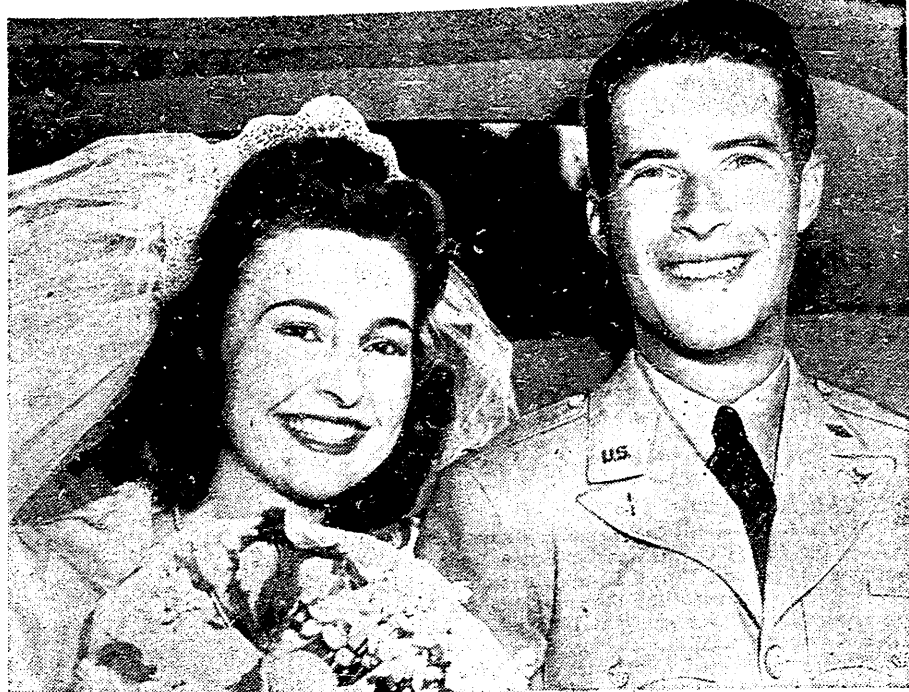

blue satin and chiffon gown with pompons in her hair. Maid of honor will be Miss Ethel Steinberg.

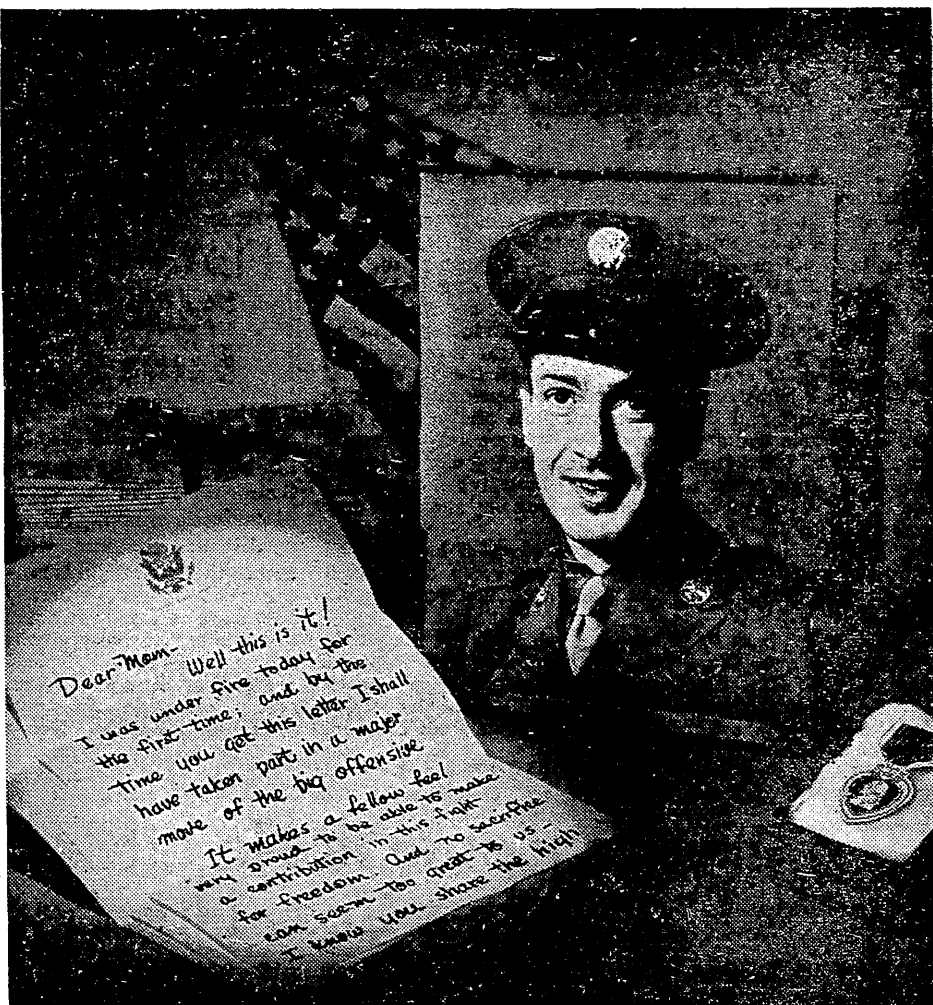
