

## Center Chemist Dies in South

Dr. Samuel Weiner, 51, a popular member of the staff of the Marathon County Extension Center for the past nine years, died unexpectedly last evening at 7:30 o'clock at Emory University, Atlanta, Ga., where he was teaching summer school.

Dr. Weiner had suffered a cerebral spasm here at the close of the first semester of the past school year, but had apparently recovered from that attack. Cause of death was not learned here today. A roommate reportedly discovered him near death when he failed to report for the evening meal last evening.

### Summer Activities

In addition to serving as assistant professor of general chemistry at the local center since 1951, Dr. Weiner had also engaged in a variety of summer activities during that period. For the past two summers he had been associated with the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies at Oak Ridge, Tenn., and he was teaching a seminar for the institute at Emory when he was fatally stricken.

He was a chemist for Roddis Plywood Co., Marshfield, in the summer of 1952 and worked as a chemist and writer for Peoples Gas Light Co., Chicago, the following summer.

A native of Duluth, Minn., he was born Dec. 5, 1908, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Isadore J. Weiner. He was married Sept. 7, 1944, in Salt Lake City to Miss Sylvia Harrison, who survives.

The deceased received his bachelor of science degree from the University of Chicago in 1930, majoring in chemistry and with a minor in history. The University of Wisconsin granted him his doctorate in 1938, with a major in inorganic chemistry.

### Served in Armed Forces

Dr. Weiner was a chemist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture from 1930 to 1932 and held a similar post with the Paul-Lewis Laboratories in Milwaukee from 1936 to 1948, with a break for two years of duty in the armed forces from 1943 to 1945. From 1948 to 1951, he was assistant professor of physical chemistry at the Duluth Branch of the University of Minnesota.

He was a member of the American Chemical Society, American Association for Advancement of Science, American Association of University Professors, Sigma Xi and Phi Lambda Upsilon. He had published about 15 papers.

Besides the widow, surviving are two sons, Mark and Steve Weiner, and a daughter, Debra Weiner, all at home; two sisters, Mrs. Samuel Tarnow, Green Bay and Mrs. Seymour Wolneck, Milwaukee, and a brother, Albert Weiner, Milwaukee.

The body will be brought here for funeral services and is expected to arrive at the Ritter & Deutsch Funeral Home either Thursday evening or Friday morning. The time of the rites had not been set by noon today.
