Eugene Wolfe Obituary

WOLFE EUGENE NOEL WOLFE (Age 91) Navy Department and Civil Service at Their Best Eugene Noel Wolfe was born in Monongah, WV, September 2, 1917 and died December 19, 2008 at Manor Care, Arlington, VA. The cause of death was cardiopulmonary arrest. He enlisted in the Navy in 1938 and served in World War II under 1945 in the U.S. Navy aboard the U.S.S. Mugford DD389, and the U.S.S. Hugh D. Rodmon, earning nine battle stars in the Pacific including the star and medal for action

in the Battle of Pearl Harbor. From 1946-1950 he attended Fairmont State College, Fairmont, WV, majoring in English Lit and Journalism and George Washington University, adding English Lit and Criticism. He was employed by the Navy Department Bureau of Aeronautics from 1950 to 1960. The last five years he was a speech and presentation writer. Following that he was a speech writer for them Rear Admiral W.A. Schoech, Rear Admiral Robert Dixon, then Rear Admiral Thomas Connelly; was BuAer Public Affairs Officer and BuWeps Public Affairs Officer. From 1960 to 1964, Mr. Wolfe was Press Officer at the Export-Import Bank of the United States. From 1964 to the present, he was Sea Power and speech writer OPNA (OP-O9D); wrote speeches for Admirals David MacDonald, CNO; Rivero, VCNO; Clary, VCNO; Cousins, VCNO. He wrote Sea Power slide presentations, documentary motion picture scripts and materials discussing America's involvement with the sea. Since 1971, the Sea Power officer (OP-O9D) was located in the Navy Recruiting Command and writing was both Sea Power and

upon Sea Power, articles as a non-byline Navy writer. He was an ardent golfer, playing with his "fearsome foursome" for many years. He and his wife, Judith, were world travelers. They married in McLean in 1973 and lived there for 36 years. Judith survives him.
